Internet safety and cyberbullying.

The children are being superstars learning how to be smart and safe on the internet. They are learning school rules as well as CEOP (Child Online Exploitation Protection) rules. We use NSPCC and government guidelines to teach your child how to stay safe online, he/she knows not to send photos or share personal details online.

Your child is using our DB Primary learning platform. Many pupils can remember their own password and are logging on at home. We monitor the use of DB Primary and we check to see who is logging on and when to the platform. We are tracking emails, messages and blogs made by the children, plus we can see and regularly check DB activity. We take internet safety very seriously.

Recently we delivered an assembly discussing "cyberbullying." We talked about "netiquette," which is about being polite online and treating others with respect. DB Primary is a **learning** platform and the children should not be sending unkind or inappropriate messages to other members of their class or year group. If a pupil abuses the privilege of using our learning platform, their account will be suspended. We take any kind of bullying, unkind or upsetting behaviour very seriously and we will deal with any cases swiftly.

We have included our school rules and remind you to supervise your child when they use DB Primary.
